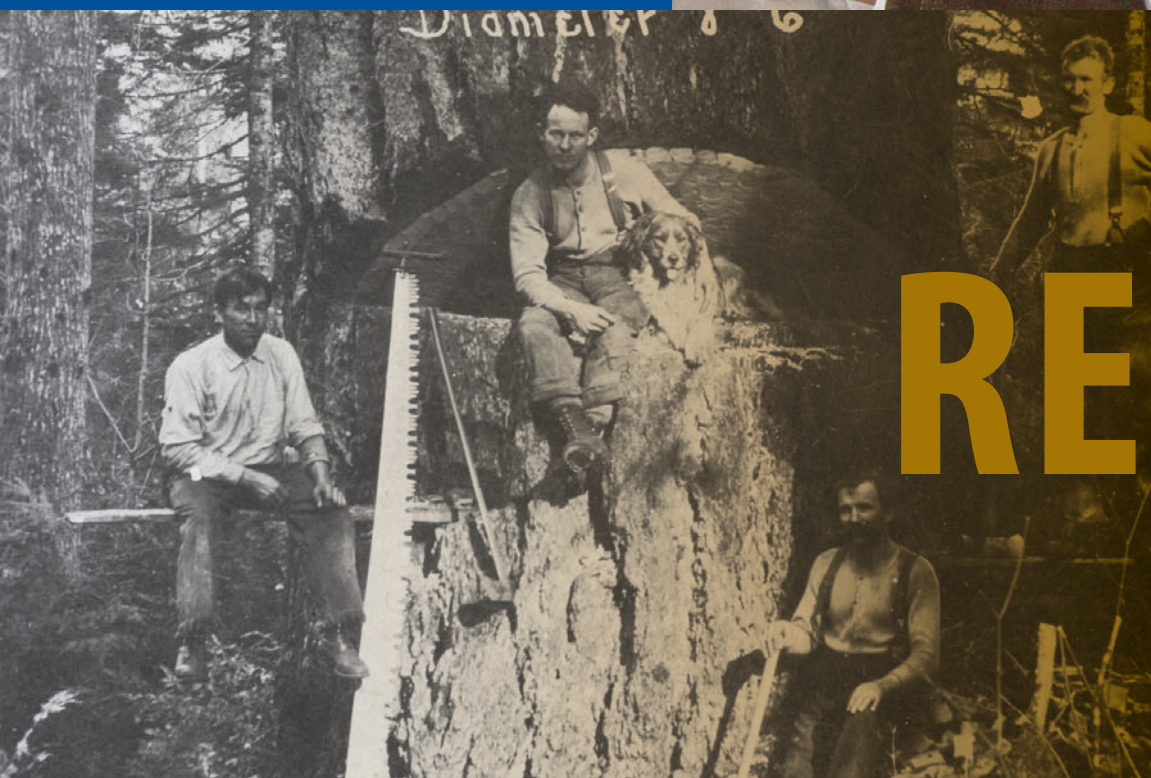

## PROGRAMS IN YOUR CLASSROOM

### Family Treasures

Grades 2 and 3

The *Family Treasures* program encourages students to explore an essential area of history...their own! Our interpreter will bring historical documents, artifacts, and photographs into your classroom, and invite students to participate in a giant treasure hunt – in their own homes! With family members, they will select a family treasure, research its story, and create a mini "museum exhibit."

**Offered:** Wed – Fri afternoons, Oct 12– Nov 25, 2011; Jan 11 – Feb 24, 2012

**Format:** THREE 60-minute in-class sessions presented by the Museum's History Interpreter.

### Historian in the School

Grades 5 and up

As History Detectives in training, students will use critical thinking to decipher clues to North Vancouver's past. While examining photographs, artifacts, and documents, they will discover the story of our first settlement, Moodyville, and will learn to undertake their own research projects. This program complements classroom curricula and makes an excellent introduction for students participating in the *Sea to Sky Regional Heritage Fair* program.

### Climbing to the Clouds: A People's History of BC Mountaineering

Grades 4 to 9

Explore mountaineering and related historical, aboriginal, recreation, conservation and arts themes. Students will investigate the relationship that the First Nations people have had with local mountains, the scientific and technical advances made by mountaineers, and their impact on wilderness conservation. ### Native - Newcomer Relations: Case Studies in Contact, Colonialism & Resistance

Grades 10 to 12 (Social Studies, B.C. First Nations 12)

Secondary level students will critically analyze both archival and contemporary newspaper articles relating to aboriginal rights and title in British Columbia. Classes also are invited to visit *Entwined Histories*, an exhibit about native activism in the 20th century. (To November 6, 2011)

Grades 2 and 3

In your classroom, students will explore the concept of community by analyzing photographs that illustrate how North Vancouver has changed over time. Activity guide, photographs and Teachers' Package included. \$50 damage deposit required for 2 week loan.

Grades 4 to 12

Highlight your students' history, theatre and arts projects!
